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ITALY'S GOVERNMENT IN CRISIS

IN ITS ALMOST 73 YEARS OF EXISTENCE, THE ITALIAN REPUBLIC HAS HAD 65 GOVERNMENTS. THIS MEANS THAT ON AVERAGE GOVERNMENTS HAVE LASTED LESS THAN 1 YEAR AND 2 MONTHS.

THE CURRENT GOVERNMENT, THE CONTE II – IT IS CUSTOM TO NUMBER GOVERNMENTS UNDER THE NAME OF THEIR PRESIDENT – HAS LASTED 501 DAYS AND COUNTING BUT IS NOW UNDER THE NOT UNUSUAL PREDICAMENT OF UNOFFICIALLY NOT HAVING A MAJORITY IN PARLIAMENT ANYMORE.

On Saturday, 1001 CDU delegates, assembled both in Berlin and virtually, elected Armin Laschet to the party leadership, marking the end of two years of political uncertainty for the German Christian Democrats. Despite having lagged behind in the polls for much of the campaign, Laschet – viewed as the continuity candidate, and widely supported by the party establishment – defeated rightwing Friedrich Merz in the second round, having left centrist Norbert Röttgen behind in the first.

France has recently hit the front pages of newspapers across the world, but for reasons that are unexpected from such a liberal country. Under the leadership of President Emmanuel Macron, France has recently taken various steps to undermine human rights — something which has gradually spoiled the country's image as the torchbearer of liberty and the defender of freedom of expression. The latest among these human rights blunders is a proposed amendment to French security law and the dissolution of a non-governmental human rights organization.

On December 2, the French government dissolved the 'Collective Against Islamophobia in France' (CCIF) in the Council of Ministers, an NGO that combats discrimination against Muslims. French Interior Minister Gerald Darmanin tweeted that this organisation, and others that protect Muslims in France, are considered "enemies of the republic".
